The Number of Registrations is looking Positive

We are pleased to inform you that the interest in the national rally has grown considerably. The registrations are flowing in and we are very close to our target.

There are still people who have submitted a registration form many months ago and have not made a payment. Please remember to use your unique ID code when you make a payment. This helps to identify you easily. Your ID code is the first four alpha letters in your surname plus the four numeric digits that were sent to you in response to your online registration. If you cannot find that information, please contact our Registrar, Bev Wood.

The 3rd Installment is now due.

If you haven't already paid the third installment, it was due on 30th September 2024. Please remember that the entire cost must be paid by 30th June 2025. No 'rally' payments will be taken at the national rally. Partial payments do not secure your site.

NO 'day/night visitors' will be allowed at the national rally except for special guests, such as sponsors.

Places to see on the Road to Mudgee

For those of you who are travelling from distant locations, we recommend visiting **Broken Hill** and surrounding places. This is a frontier mining town in the far west of New South Wales, in the Australian outback. It's worth spending a few days there.

The beautiful old buildings can be explored with a



volunteer guide, who has a wealth



of knowledge. Bookings can be made at the Tourist Information Centre. Overlooking the town is the Line of Lode Miners Memorial with all the names of miners lost. This is very moving. Also up there is The Big Bench, which you can sit on and look over the town below.

At The Silver City Mint and Art Centre there is an abundance of unique items for sale. As you wander through, you will come onto a boardwalk where you view the magnificent Big Picture. This acrylic painting of Broken Hill is 100 metres in circumference and 12 metres high. It was painted by one man, Peter Anderson (Ando) and is an unbelievable achievement and a 'must' to see.

Close by is the Sulphide Street Railway Historical Museum where you can walk through old trains and see memorabilia and reminisce about your youth. A short drive takes you to behind the stone facade of the restored former Bond Store. This is Broken Hill's must-see mining museum. The Albert Kersten Mining and Minerals Museum displays information on how the world's largest deposit of silver, lead and zinc was formed here in Broken Hill. It also houses a collection of Dolls and Bear on Display.

There are also plenty of Art Galleries to explore including Pro Hart's with his quirky painted cars too. You can do a tour at the Royal Flying Doctor Service where you will learn the importance of this service.



A drive up to The Living Desert State Park will amaze you with 12 Sandstone Sculptures. This is the most photographed site in the Australian Outback. Plenty to see and do in Broken Hill.

Silverton is a small village 26km north west of Broken Hill. Stop for a drink and meal at the original Silverton Hotel where you can see a display of photographs from various movies shot in the area - Razorback, Mission Impossible 2, Mad Max 2 and Priscilla Queen of the Desert. The Mad Max Museum is a tribute to the movie showcasing a huge display of props, life size characters and photos. Scattered around the village are cars which have been painted and also John Dynon Art Gallery. He specializes in painting Emu's, Flowers and Dunnies.

Mundi Mundi Plains

A short drive out of town is the Mundi Mundi Plains. From the top the view is spectacular of vast plains stretching as far as the eye can see. On a clear day you can see the curvature of the earth.





Menindee Lakes

These lakes are 115km south east from Broken Hill. It is a haven for water birds of all kinds. There is plenty of room for camping. Check road conditions but we believe the road is currently being sealed. Kinchega Woolshed which was built in 1875 of corrugated iron and river red gum is a must see. The historic Woolshed is a vast and very well preserved

classic piece of Australian pastoral heritage. Inside you'll see wool presses and tables, machine room and an original steam engine as well as sweating pens. Six Million sheep were sheared here - an amazing feat.
